Pastor's Thoughts

You may have noticed that every Sunday we publish in the bulletin our Mission Statement. I want to drill down on what the significance of this statement is. By definition, a church mission statement is a brief summary of what a church exists to do, helping guide its decisions and priorities. It encapsulates the church's core values, beliefs, and objectives, serving as a roadmap for its activities and direction. A mission statement defines the purpose and calling of the church, while a vision statement focuses on the future goals. For Christian organizations, a mission statement outlines fundamental beliefs, values, and goals.

Our Mission Statement declares in 4 brief statements what we understand our purpose to be, and, what are the priorities that drive what we do. Everything we do at the direction of the Session, Deacons and Trustees needs to be informed and reflect one or more of these elements of our mission statement. Without a doubt the statement is more aggressive and interactive. It calls us to become more involved in witnessing and discipleship. It expects each of us to roll up our sleeves and seize the opportunities to share this magnificent faith that has brought blessing upon blessing to every single one of us.

Our Mission Statement is very simple and forthright. We will ...

Engage with the lost ... Establish in the faith ... Equip to serve ... Empower to go

The emphasis in each component is on our personal involvement with people as we advance the cause of Christ and build up the Church of Jesus Christ and our congregation. The statement not only puts an emphasis on working outside the congregation in the community, but at the same time work within the congregation to grow and strengthen our capability to fulfill the Great Commission of going out into the world to teach, preach and baptize, and, bring everyone into a vibrant and vital relationship with Jesus Christ. With this

statement in place, we can plan our work more effectively, utilizing and maximizing the use of our resources.

Each component of this statement is a dynamic enactment of what Christ has called us to be and do as his church. We are first and foremost his body, and as such, are expected to be active in the world doing that which he did in his ministry before dying on the cross. Over the next few newsletters, I will explain what each of these components means so that everyone will not just understand them, but embrace them as personal goals.

First up, **Engage with the Lost**. This may be one of the most challenging aspects of our work, and one that we are the most uncomfortable with. In part, because as much as the scriptures make this a fundamental part of the work of disciples, we have not spent much time trying to understand the concept of "the lost." A knee-jerk response might lead you to jump to the conclusion that we are "judging" people. That is not at all what this means.

One line in the familiar hymn "Amazing Grace" says, "I once was lost but now am found, was blind but now I see." We have sung this old favorite hymn hundreds of times without realizing what lost means. The term lost best describes those persons who have wandered away and are helpless to find their way back. Human beings are spiritually lost who have wandered away from God and we don't know how to find our way back. Isaiah 53:6 says, "all we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way ...". Jesus tells the parable of the lost sheep in Luke 15:3-7: The Good Shepherd is willing to leave the ninety-nine sheep who are safe in the fold to go in search for the one lost sheep. The sheep would never have found the Shepherd on his own. It is out of a love for the sheep that the shepherd intentionally seeks the lost sheep to bring it to safety.

The lost include those who have never experienced God's love or been invited to consider a personal relationship with Jesus Christ as well as those who have fallen away from being part of a faith community. It does not necessarily suggest that the lost are not saved. Being saved is solely based on a person's confession of faith. However, if a person has never had a relationship with God in Jesus Christ, then they are not saved and therefore lost means not being saved. John 3:16 is often quoted in circumstances like this and rightfully so. God did so loved the world so much that he gave his son, Jesus Christ, to death. God loves the "world," which means every human being. All have been created in the image of God; all are God's children; all are loved equally; and God desires all of his children to be in a faith/love relationship with him. However, the second part of this verse requires careful reading. "That whoever of all these folks in the world believe in him will without doubt or question receive and experience eternal life." It is just as important to read and understand what isn't written, but implied: "that whoever of these folks in the world who do not

believe in him will not receive or experience eternal life, but eternal punishment."

We are all born lost, even though we did nothing wrong and had no opportunity (yet) to make any decisions, we are lost, thanks to the original sin of Adam and Eve. It is God's desire that we choose to believe, that we choose to accept his son, that we choose to have a personal relationship with him. Our purpose is to go out into the world and seek the lost. The Great Commission in Matthew 28 says this. Throughout the gospels we find parables regarding the lost. Just for starts there's the Prodigal Son and the Pearl of Great Price.

Every human being is either lost or found. There is no state of neutrality. One is either saved or not saved, and our responsibility is to seek those who are lost and help them if they choose help to find their way into faith. In order to accomplish this, we must "engage" with them. That means personally interact with them, talk and share with them, and above all let people know how precious they are to God and to us. The parable of the sower helps us further understand the concept of "lost." If you recall, the sower goes out to sow his seed. Remember how some seed falls on a hard path, some seed falls in the weeds and some falls on fertile ground.

People can have all the best intentions about their faith life but get distracted. It can be as easy as a job change, schedules changing, marriages, births, retirement. Others experience hard times, tragedies and trauma. They are so consumed with fighting for survival, they forget they don't have to do it alone. They are considered "lost." With empathy, compassion and a boatload of grace, we seek these folk and help them find their way back to the one who knows them best, as well as back into the fellowship of the church.

Mission Envelopes

First Presbyterian Church has a robust mission program with the majority of our projects supporting local causes. We care for homeless teens, support those people seeking to rebuild their lives leaving failure in the rearview mirror and seizing new life and a hope filled future. We feed the hungry and provide socialization for those who are lonely. We provide support for those who have been domestically abused and threatened as well as those who are homeless. We also provide support to those who are battling cancer.

Many of you have wanted to do something beyond your pledge to the church to support a project that speaks to your heart. To that end, we are providing mission support envelopes in each bulletin on the first Sunday of the month for you to make a contribution to your favorite mission or mission projects in general. These envelopes can also be found on the table in the sanctuary. If it is God's leading that you provide support to a particular cause, place it in the envelope and return it in the offering plate. This becomes what is called, "SECOND MILE" giving. It is added to the amount already budgeted for support to these projects.

A Souper Bowl Party for Super Bowl Sunday
You are encouraged to bring donations of food items for the local food pantries or cash donations.

What is Souper Bowl Sunday about?

In 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year, they invited 22 area churches to join the team and collected \$5,700 with 100% of donations distributed to local-area charities.

That was 1990. Since then, Tackle Hunger, with its signature Souper Bowl of Caring event has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$193 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

Thousands of participants including: churches, schools, youth groups, community partners, grocery partners, local businesses, media partners, NFL teams and passionate individuals have experienced for themselves, the joy and satisfaction of giving, serving and inspiring people across the country to follow their generous example.
