"Is That All There Is?" What comes next after Easter


In 1969 Peggy Lee, an American singer, recorded a song entitled, "Is That All There Is?" It reached #11 on Billboard. At the time, I struggled with the song as it seemed like she was intoning the spirit of a Debbie Downer. The singer didn't sing, but spoke the song. At the time it seemed to resonate with the people.

The lyrics of this song are written from the point of view of a person who is disillusioned with events in life that are supposedly unique experiences. The singer tells of witnessing her family's house on fire when she was a little girl, seeing the circus, and falling in love for the first time. After each recital, "let's break out the booze and have a ball—if that's all there is," instead of worrying about life. She explains that she'll never kill herself either because she knows that death will be a disappointment as well. Is that all there is?

Easter has come and gone, and I assume there are those who might be saying, "Is that all there is?" We've been to the top of the mountain and felt the exhileration of the celebration, where can we possibly go from here? In the weeks after the resurrection, the disciples weren't sure what was coming next. The disciples appear to have gone their own ways. The brothers Zebedee returned to their boats on the Sea of Galilee and were fishing. People were spending time just trying to figure out where it all went.

But Jesus' return to affirm he had kept God's promise of being raised from the dead began to serve notice that, that was not the end of the story. In fact, for the disciples this was the prologue to a vibrantly rich and exciting ministry of going out into the world further than they had ever ventured and sharing the greatest story to ever be told. Fifty days after Easter comes Pentecost, and with that the empowerment of the Holy Spirit. They were on the verge of changing the world forever. It's 2100 years later and we have a phenomenal opportunity to change the world in and for Jesus Christ. It is our time to share the greatest story ever and to be in awe of how God transforms lives, families, communities, nations. There is nothing new under the sun. No improved model. Jesus and the message of life, hope, renewal is as fresh today as it has always been. The ingredient in this recipe is us.

Do we feel the excitement and energy and power of the gospel? Do we feel motivated to bring the world to Jesus Christ? This isn't about us, but the one who came back from the dead and lives among us and will remain with us forever.



Last Element of Mission Statement

The fourth and final element of our Mission Statement is "Empowered to Go." Jesus never anticipated that upon coming to faith in him, we would sit around tables in classroom and Fellowship Hall and just talk about how good it feels to be saved. You might recall that following his resurrection in the gospel of Matthew, he took his disciples out of the city of Jerusalem onto a mountain, and had them look as far as they could in all directions, and told them to go out into all the nations. No more mourning his death, but celebrating his life; no more fear of reprisal, but having confidence to share the Good News to one and all. The last element of our Mission Statement reflects this sentiment and spirit.

From everything shared in the three preceding sections, it is a reasonable conclusion that we empower one another to go out into the world, to leave the security of our sanctuaries and take Jesus Christ to those places where we can teach, share, witness, testify and care. We are to go to the young, middle aged, and elderly. We are to meet with the rich and poor, males and females. People of diverse cultures, colors, creeds and orientations. We are to go where God's people are and meet them in their state of being and need.

Being one who serves is a part of what it means to be a Christ-follower. God wants us to, through the empowerment of His Holy Spirit, follow His command from Isaiah 1:17, "Learn to do right; seek justice. Defend the oppressed. Take up the cause of the fatherless; plead the case of the widow." We are called to serve not only the people we see in our daily lives but look for opportunities to serve the oppressed, orphaned, widows, and seek the cause of justice whenever we have the chance. All of this starts with inviting God into our days and asking Him to be our strength when we feel weak.

Let me remind you of the Lost Sheep parable Jesus told. The Good Shepherd's concern was not for the 99 who were safe and secure, but for the 1 that was out in the world lost and alone. The Good Shepherd did not discount that single sheep as worthless or an "acceptable loss" and stay in the barn with the 99. He went out because that one sheep had value and a place in the flock. This is echoed in the Old Testament in Leviticus 19:34: "The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native born. Love them as yourself, for you were foreigners in Egypt. I am the LORD your God."

Our goal is to develop within our church members the confidence and courage to go out and seek the lost and broken, those in darkness.

From the Pastor's Desk

May Sermon

"Our Role as Prophets"

This Month of May will provide us an opportunity to learn what the Judeo-Christian tradition of prophecy is, both from what it has been and what it means for today. We often think of prophets as people like Elijah who was empowered by God to perform miracles. But that is not the case. In our faith tradition, prophets see the world from God's perspective. Prophets speak God's truth, often at great risks to themselves. In the spirit of Isaiah, Jesus reminds us that we are called to speak the truth with love, but always speak the truth.

The great 20th century rabbi, Abraham Herschel, wrote: "The prophet is an iconoclast, challenging the apparently holy, revered, and awesome. Beliefs cherished as certainties, institutions endowed with supreme sanctity, the prophet exposes the scandalous pretensions." In other words, a prophet is always in trouble with authority. Take Jeremiah, for example. He had many powerful enemies in the Judean aristocracy and the Levitical priesthood. We know he survived at least one assassination attempt. The bottom line is, if someone claims to be a prophet but no trouble comes their way, they're probably not a prophet. They're not directly challenging people in power. Instead, they've surrounded themselves with like-minded people.

Even in the middle of harshly condemning political or religious authorities, all prophets take time to speak about the goodness and holiness of God. It is through Jeremiah that God declares: "I will place my law within them, and write it upon their hearts; I will be their God, and they shall be my people ... everyone, from the least to the greatest, shall know me." (Jer. 31:33, 34) Jesus instructs us to speak in the light what we hear in the dark. But if we only speak in anger without expressing the joy of the gospel, that is a form of truth-telling that is better defined as protest and falls abysmally short of prophecy.

So the question we will wrestle with in May is, how often will we advocate for raising up marginalized groups and call the mighty to accountability? Do we do it only when we have nothing to lose? How far are we willing to go for God? How far are we willing to go in upsetting the powerful? How far are we willing to go for those who are loved by no one else? And equally important, how do we do it and what words do we use? Come each week and help me wrestle with what it means to be prophetic.

Adult Education

The Adult Sunday Morning class, which meets in Edwards Chapel at 9:00 a.m., is beginning a new series of lessons entitled "The Big Ten." No, it is not a study of the Big Ten Athletic Conference, which means we will not be talking about Hawkeye football, basketball or anything else. We're going to look at the Ten Commandments.

Author Ron Lavin, an ordained Lutheran Pastor, says, "The Ten Commandments are both in and out of the news these days. They are in the news because there are significant voices calling for them to be posted in classrooms and courtrooms. When Our nation faces the challenge of internal moral decline or external terrorist attacks, some people look to the Ten Commandments to point the way to national security. How effective (or constitutional) this suggested remedy might be, remains open to lively debate.

On the other hand, there are voices saying the Ten Commandments are irrelevant in today's world. With the denial of the existence of any absolute truth or moral standards, the Ten Commandments seem to be little more than an artifact of an ancient patriarchal society. In a culture that emphasizes personal choice based almost exclusively on personal values and needs, Godgiven structures sometimes seem too restrictive."

Our study will take another view. We will be working from the premise that the Ten Commandments continue to provide both significant prohibitions and helpful invitations for living a moral and godly life in the twenty-first century. We say that a person is a ten, we mean that they are exceptional. When we say that a program is a ten, we mean that it is exceptional. The Ten Commandments are intended to convey that God's Law is not only exceptional, but excellent in every way.

I hope you will choose to spend this hour with us each week and develop a new appreciation and respect for the Ten Commandments. There is an empty seat waiting just for you.








Our Magnolia Tree is Blooming!




Shepherd's Table Menu
